Temple Sinai is Turning 30!!

And the Celebration Continues as **Our Congregation Approves New Rabbi**

On Monday, February 16, after an extensive search to find a new rabbi, the Rabbi Search Committee was pleased to introduce Rabbi Anne Belford to the congregation. The Board of Trustees approved the choice on February 19, and the Congregation met on February 26 to grant its approval.

For the past five years, Rabbi Belford has been an Associate Rabbi at Congregation Shaare Emeth in St. Louis and is now looking forward to returning to Texas. Ironically, her first rabbinic related position was as an intern at Temple Mount Sinai in her native El Paso.

Rabbi Annie sums it up this way:

“Simply put, I love Judaism. I love its rituals, its teachings, its foundations. I love that it invites me to struggle with what it offers. I love that it places community, and our connections to one another, at the forefront of our lives. This love and enthusiasm infuses every aspect of my rabbinate. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve God this way, and to serve the Jewish community.”

Rabbi's Message – Barry Diamond



Purim: Serious Fun

One humorist described all Jewish holidays as containing three necessary elements: "Our enemies tried to kill us; they failed; let's eat."

In many ways, Purim embodies this narrative, with its powerful story of near destruction and, of course, *Hamentashen*, those delicious triangle-shaped cookies filled with prune, poppy seed or chocolate. Purim is celebrated through the retelling of our prevailing over the despotic Haman as told in the Book of Esther, dressing up in masks and costumes, and consuming a fair bit of alcohol. For most Jews, the tradition of binge drinking is no longer a central element of Purim celebrations; however, the idea of dressing up in masks and costumes is still widely practiced.

The beauty of the Purim mask as a symbol of Purim is that the brash exuberance displayed on the outside of the mask belies the seriousness that lies underneath. Purim can be raucous, rambunctious, and often downright fun. And so is our Temple Sinai Purim celebration on Monday, March 9th. But Purim asks an underlying question. Is it good to live outside of the Land of Israel where Jews like Esther hide their Jewish identity, where we are attacked by wicked men such as Haman, and we survive by luck and the benevolence of foolish leaders? The Book of Esther begs us to think about what it means to be a Jew living in a non-Jewish country. In a time honored Jewish tradition from the Marx Brothers to Lenny Bruce and Jerry Seinfeld, the Book of Esther uses sarcasm and parody to make its point.

What lessons should we draw from its words and from the holiday the book has spawned?

First, living in Israel provides a certain amount of autonomy for the Jewish people to make our own decisions, although, that does not mean that our destiny is wholly in our own hands.

Second, our survival is still influenced by others' governments and people, including evil Hamanesque leaders who ironically still live in modern day Persia (Iran). As Jews we must focus on developing and maintaining our relationship with the non-Jewish nations of the world, as did Mordecai and Esther.

Third, we should continue to celebrate our lives and freedom every moment we are able. There is an ironic freedom to realizing that our world is forever perilous. It is the same type of freedom that we experience when we realize that our lives on this earth are limited. This insight bids us to live prudently, but live well. Don the masks of celebration and rejoice that today we are free.

Join us as we celebrate the Jewish delivery in Shushan and our own freedom that we enjoy today.

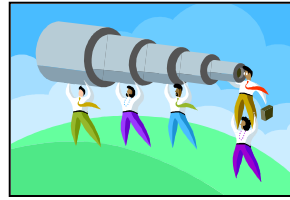

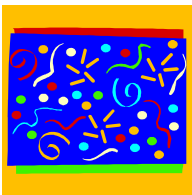
Senior Sisters
